GENERAL INFORMATION

The Winter Quarter of the West Tennessee State Teachers College, session of 1926-1927, will open Monday, December 29, 1926, and continue for twelve weeks. The Spring Quarter will begin March 21, 1927, and will close June 7th. It will be divided into two terms of six weeks each, the first term beginning March 21st, and the second term April 28th. The Summer Quarter will also cover twelve weeks and will be divided into two terms of six weeks each. The first term of the Summer Quarter will begin June 9, 1927, and the second term July 20th. The quarter will close August 27, 1927.

In the Winter Quarter all courses will be given for twelve weeks. Many of the courses offered are continuous, the first having been given during the Fall Quarter. All of the courses given are listed in the following pages. Those starred may be taken by students who have not taken the corresponding course of the Fall Quarter. Those not starred are open only to students who have taken the corresponding course in the Fall Quarter, or an equivalent course at some other time.

In the Spring and Summer Quarters some courses will be given for six weeks and some for twelve weeks. Most courses will begin at the beginning of the quarter, but a few courses will be offered for the last six weeks. Students may register for the whole quarter, or for either term. Credit will not be given for less than six weeks' attendance. Students desiring credit for six weeks' work should register not later than the third day of the term, and no credit for a six weeks' term will be allowed for a later registration. To count credit made during a six weeks' term toward the renewal of a certificate the student must register not later than the second day of the term; and to count a quarter's credit towards certificate or renewal, registration must be completed on or before the fourth day of the quarter. Students desiring full credit for a quarter's work should register during the first week of the quarter.

The Spring and Summer Quarters are being divided into terms of six weeks each in order to accommodate teachers desiring certificates, or the renewal of certificates, who may not be able to stay for the entire Spring or Summer Quarter. Students may make a full quarter's work by attending the first term of the Fall Quarter and one term of the Spring or Summer Quarter, or by attending the last term of the Spring Quarter and the first term of the Summer Quarter. There will be a limited number of courses which may be taken in this way and many teachers may be accommodated thereby.

Teachers are advised to start at the beginning of the quarter when possible and to continue for the full quarter. Where this is impracticable a full quarter's credit may be made by attendance at two six weeks' terms.

SPECIAL COURSES FOR TEACHERS IN SERVICE

In order to meet the needs of the teachers in service the College is offering a number of courses scheduled to meet Saturday morning and convenient afternoon hours. In all of these courses full College credit is given, and teachers in service have an opportunity of working towards a College degree while carrying on their regular work of instruction.

ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS

For unconditional entrance to the freshman class, the applicant must be at least sixteen years of age and must be a graduate of a standard four-year high school accredited by the State Department of Education or by the Commission on Accredited Schools of the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, with at least fifteen approved high school units.

Graduates of unaccredited schools doing four years of high school work may be admitted on certificate from their principal, provided they pass satisfactory examination on four units of high school work taken in their fourth year at the high school.

Teachers and prospective teachers, twenty-one years of age and over, who have not completed four years of high school work may be admitted as special students and allowed to take such courses as they are prepared for, provided that such special students must satisfy all entrance requirements to qualify for diploma or degree.

Such teachers will find many courses in the curricula offered adapted to their needs—courses dealing with common school branches and other phases of elementary education, as well as courses on special subjects beginning in the freshman year. The Summer Quarter will offer regular college courses, and also many courses bearing on elementary and high school work, with a wide variety of professional courses that will appeal to all teachers.

EXPENSES

There are no tuition charges to students who are residents of Tennessee; non-residents pay \$30.00 per quarter. All students pay a registration fee of \$5.00 and a student activity fee of \$3.00 each quarter, and a breakage fee of \$1.00 once a year. The total expenses for boarding students, including board, lodging, laundry, and all school fees, are \$83.00 for the Winter Quarter and the same amount for the Spring Quarter. Students in attendance for a term of six weeks will be charged proportionately for board, lodging, laundry. The other fees are the same for a six weeks' term or a quarter. Rooms are rented by the quarter and no reduction will be made for late registration, or for absence of less than a month. Board is charged from the beginning of the term and no reduction is allowed for late registration. Students absent from the dining hall for two weeks or more on account of illness or withdrawal from school before the close of the term, will be entitled to a refund.

Registration and student activity fees are not refunded, and no other refund will be made except as indicated above.

LABORATORY FEES

The following fees are charged students pursuing courses in the several departments to cover materials used:

All courses in Chemistry, \$2.00 each per quarter.

Home Economics, 100, 101, 102, 103, 300, 301, 302, 303, 307, 410, and 411, 50 cents each; 104, \$1.00; 204, 304, 306, \$2.50 each; 205, 206, \$3.50 each.

Education 204, 50 cents; Education, 304, \$1.00.

RESERVATIONS

It is very important that those who expect to attend the College should write to the President and have room reserved as soon as they definitely determine to attend. Arrangements will be made for all who come, but rooms will be reserved in the order in which applications are received. A deposit fee of \$3.00 is required for reservation which will be credited on the expenses for the term.

WHAT THE STUDENTS FURNISH

Students rooming in the dormitories should bring the following articles: Towels, bed linen, blankets, and a pillow. Students living in the dormitories will be required to keep their own rooms in order, and the matron will make daily inspection.

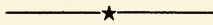
