Registration Procedure (Continued)

1. X-ray equipment will be set up in the doctor's office located on the first floor of the Administration Building.
2. A student may cancel a course before it has met the *third* time by obtaining the approval of his advisor.
3. A student may add a course before it has met the *fourth* time by obtaining the approval of his advisor provided he does not exceed the maximum number of hours permitted for that day of the registration period: 18 hrs. through the second day, 15 hrs. through the third day, and 12 hrs. through the fourth day.
4. A student may drop a course before mid-term (November 4) by obtaining a drop card from the instructor and personally presenting it to the director of the school in which he is registered for approval.
5. A student may withdraw from the College by advising the Dean in writing. Failure to give official notice of withdrawal will result in a grade of "F" in each course for which the student is registered.
6. *All* women students must have the Dean of Women's notation that place of residence is approved.

The application should be attached to a statement from the student's advisor certifying that the student has met the certification requirements in the subject matter area. If approved, the application should be taken to Mr. Roland, coordinator of student teaching assignments, for processing.
