Admission to Graduate School

1. Application blanks for admission to the Graduate School may be secured from the Registrar's office, and all inquiries should be addressed to the Registrar.
2. Admission credentials for new graduate students must be on file in the Registrar's office before May 20, 1956.
3. Qualifying examination for admission to either term of summer school will be given at 9:00 A.M., on May 26, 1956. A fee of \$2.00 will be charged for the examination.

Procedure of Registration

1. Registration cards are issued in the Registrar's Office ONLY. (Adm. 206).
2. After securing registration materials, complete them, and secure the approval of advisors (both major and minor).
3. Secure class cards from Departmental Chairmen.
4. Present all materials to Director of Graduate School.
5. After the registration is approved by the Director, materials must be taken to the Bursar's Office where all fees must be paid. Registration is not complete until all fees are paid. **VETERANS:** Request information from the office of the Director of the Graduate School.

Graduate School Regulations

1. Twelve semester hours shall be maximum load for students devoting the full summer to graduate study. Only six semester hours may be registered for during one term of the summer session.
2. After a graduate student has completed his registration, it cannot be changed without approval of the Director of the Graduate School. The adjustment will originate in the office of the Director, and the change-of-course must have the approval of the student's advisor and the Director.
3. Failure to give official notice of withdrawal in writing will result in a grade of "F" in each course for which the student was registered. Address your notice of withdrawal to the Director.
4. To become a candidate for a degree, the student must file an application on blanks available at the Office of the Director. The application must contain plans for a complete program of graduate study and be approved by a faculty advisor in both the major and minor areas.
5. At least one-half of the courses in a student's degree program must be of the type designated as primarily for graduate students (i.e., 500 level). Work done by graduate students registered for G-400 courses must be of a higher quality than that required of undergraduates. Also the graduate student is required to do additional work. This may consist of research or of such other work as the instructor may demand.

Expenses

Maintenance Fee—6 semester hours or more, \$45.00

Maintenance Fee—6 semester hours or less, \$7.50 per semester hour

Non-resident tuition—6 semester hours or more, \$30.00

Non-resident tuition—6 semester hours or less, \$5.00 per semester hour

NOTE: Students who take combination graduate and undergraduate courses will pay for graduate courses according to the above schedule, and undergraduate courses according to the schedule listed in the undergraduate catalog. In no case will the fees and tuition for such a student exceed those charged for a full-time graduate student.
