Admission to Graduate School

- 1. Application blanks for admission to the Graduate School may be secured from the Registrar's Office, and all inquiries should be addressed to the Registrar.
- Admission credentials (application, two undergraduate transcripts and entrance examination scores) for new graduate students must be on file in the Registrar's Office by Aug. 25, 1962. All applicants, including Memphis State University graduates, are required to take an entrance examination.
- 3. Qualifying examinations for admission to Graduate School will be given in Room 216, Johnson Hall, on Aug. 27, at 3:00 P.M., Aug. 28, at 3:00 P.M., and Sept. 8, at 9:00 A.M. and 11:00 A.M., Requests to take the examination should be made to the Registrar's Office two weeks in advance of the desired date.
- 4. A fee of \$2.00 will be charged for the examination and a pre-registration fee of \$10.00 (no refunds) must be paid before one may take the examination. A receipt will be required for admission to the examination. This receipt will also be required when fees are paid at registration. These fees should be paid in the Bursar's Office, 208 Administration Building at least one week prior to the time of the examination. Office hours are 8 A.M. to 4 P.M. except Saturday when the hours are 9 A.M. to 12.

Procedure of Registration

- 1. Registration cards are issued in the Registrar's Office ONLY. (Adm. 204).
- 2. After securing registration materials, confer with your major adviser, complete materials, and secure signatures of both major and minor advisers.

NOTE: New gaduate students will be assigned major and minor advisors in the Graduate Office (A203). Be prepared to declare your major and minor areas of study in your interview with the Director of the Graduate School. (This should be done prior to registration day).

- 3. Secure class cards from Departmental Chairmen.
- 4. Present all materials to Director of Graduate School.
- 5. After the registration is approved by the Director, materials must be taken to the Bursar's Office where all fees must be paid. Registration is not complete until all fees are paid. VETERANS: Request information from the office of the Director of the Graduate School.
- 6. Secure a parking permit from the Dean of Men.

Current Students

Graduate students who are in residence during the summer of 1962 will not have registration materials prepared for them unless they notify the Records Office, Room 206 of the Administration Building of their intention to register for the fall semester.

Students who have notified the Records Office before Aug. 3 of plans to attend the fall semester may obtain registration materials beginning Aug. 14, and continuing through Aug. 17.

Graduate School Regulations

- . Sixteen semester hours shall be maximum load for students devoting full time to graduate study. Only full-time students may register for more than twelve semester hours of course work in any one semester, including courses on campus, extension courses, and courses to be transferred from other institutions.
- After a graduate student has completed his registration, it cannot be changed without approval of the Director of the Graduate School. The adjustment will originate in the office of the Director, and the change-of-course must have the approval of the student's adviser and the Director.

ADDING: —No course may be added after September 28.

DROPPING: —No course may be dropped after October 20.

- 3. Failure to give official notice of complete withdrawal from Graduate School in writing will result in a grade of "F" in each course for which the student was registered. Address your notice of withdrawal to the Director.
- 1. To become a candidate for a degree, the student must file an application on blanks available at the Office of the Director. The application must contain plans for a complete program of graduate study and be approved by a faculty adviser in both the major and minor areas. Unless "Intent to Graduate" cards are on file by Oct. 19, one cannot be assured of diploma on Feb. 2, 1963.

FORMER STUDENTS, including those not registered at Memphis State for the 1962 Spring Semester and/or who have attended another college since last attending Memphis State, must clear admission requirements with the Registrar's Office as follows:

- 1. Complete the application for readmission form provided by the Registrar's Office.
- Request the registrar of each college attended, if any, to mail two manuscripts of college credits to the Registrar's Office.
