Advanced packet pickup will be held on January 12-13-14-15-16. Former graduate stuents who complete re-admission requirements by Monday, January 4, may obtain their packets n those dates in the Records Office. A former student who does not apply for re-admission y January 4, may not receive his packet before 9:00 A.M., February 6, 1965.

Packets will be prepared for all current students, request by the student is not necessary. The graduate student who has filled out the cards in his packet and had his courses proved by his adviser will go to the Card Center at 9:00 A.M., February 6, and secure his ourse cards without delay. See the steps in the Registration Procedure on the next page.

Admission to Graduate School

- An application blank shall be completed and filed with the Dean of Admissions, not lat than January 16, 1965, for the Spring term.
- 2. Two transcripts of undergraduate work shall be on file with the Dean of Admissions January 16. At least one of the transcripts must come directly from the undergradua institution. (Memphis State University graduates will have transcripts provided.)
- 3. A score on the Miller Analogies Test shall be on file with the Dean of Admissions. Out City students are encouraged to take the test at an institution near them and to have t scores sent to Memphis State University. Graduate Record Examination scores may accepted in lieu of the Miller Analogies Test.
- 4. The Miller Analogies Test will be given in Room 200, Administration Building, by t Testing and Guidance Director at Memphis State University on the following dates: N vember 21 at 10:00 A.M., December 19 at 8:30 A.M. and at 10:00 A.M., December at 9:00 A.M., January 23 at 8:30 A.M. and at 10:00 A.M.
- 5. A fee of \$2.00 will be charged for the test. It must be paid at the Business Office, 2 Administration Building, prior to the Examination. The receipt is required for admissi to the testing room. The Business Office is open from 8:00 A.M. to 4:00 P.M. daily excessaturday when it is open 9 A.M. to Noon.
- 6. The student who must take the test should call or write the Guidance and Testing Offic Room 204, Administration Building, 324-3601, extension 242, to establish a date. Eatesting session is limited to 25.
- 7. The student should arrange an interview with the Dean of the Graduate School, Roc 210, Administration Building, as soon as possible after he has met all admissions requiments. His registration may be delayed if the interview has not been arranged prior Registrations day. Write or call 324-3600 extension 253 for an appointment.

Procedure of Registration

- Registration cards (packets) are issued in the Records section of the Registrar's Off. ONLY. (218 Administration Building)
- 2. Packets will be prepared for current students without request.
- 3. After securing registration materials, confer with your adviser, fill in blanks on pack cards, and secure signatures of both major and minor advisers.
- 4. Secure class cards from departmental chairmen at Card Center in the Field House exce for Business course cards which will be available in the Business Administration building
- 5. Present all materials to the check-out station of the Graduate School. (300 Administration Building).
- 6. After the registration is approved by the Dean, materials must be taken to the Bursa Office where all fees must be paid. Registration is not complete until all fees are pa VETERANS: Request information from the office of the Dean of the Graduate Schoo
- 7. Secure a parking permit from the Dean of Men. Parking permits are valid from Septemb 1964 to September 1, 1965.

Graduate School Regulations

- Sixteen semester hours shall be maximum load for students devoting full time to gradual study. Only full-time students may register for more than twelve semester hours of course work in any one semester, including courses on campus, extension courses, and courses to be transferred from other institutions. Students who have full-time positions may not enro for more than two courses.
- After a graduate student has completed his registration, it cannot be changed without approval of the Dean of the Graduate School. The adjustment will originate in the office of the Dean, and the change-of-course must have the approval of the student's advise and the Dean.

- Failure to give official notice of complete withdrawal from Graduate School in writing wi

- 4. To become a candidate for a degree, the student must file an application on blanks avai able at the Office of the Dean. The application must contain plans for a complete program of graduate study and be approved by a faculty adviser in both the major and minor area Unless "Intent to Graduate" cards are on file by March 12, one cannot be assured diploma on May 29, 1965.
- A student must have an overall B average in graduate courses at the beginning of the semester in order to be placed on the list for graduation in that semester.
- 6. If a student withdraws from the University within seven days after the beginning classes for the semester, a refund will be made of 80% of fees; each week thereafter, the amount will be reduced 20%.
